Summary description

A small remnant of woodland, surrounded on all sides by urban development. The canopy comprises mainly Sessile oak, Beech and Downy Birch, with a dense, understorey of Holly and Hazel. The western part of the wood grades into damper, scrubby woodland with willows and Blackthorn. The ground flora is dominated by Bramble and has a high proportion of garden throwout plants, but still includes a number semi-natural indicator species, including Bluebell, Wood sedge and Cow-wheat.

Qualifying features

Broad-leaved woodland with an assemblage of semi-natural indicator species.

Secondary features

Scrub.

Potential value/ unconfirmed features

The site is likely to be used by foraging bats and has potential to include bat roosts.

Current management (including problems and opportunities for biodiversity enhancement)

The woodland appears unmanaged. It currently suffers a number of urban problems, particularly tipping, littering, fires and vandalism. Garden plants have become widespread within the wood as a result of tipping garden refuse. Some houses backing onto the woodland have gates leading to large piles of refuse and it is strongly recommended that the refuse is removed, and the households told to cease tipping.

Access/ community use

There is no formal public access to the SINC, but it is criss-crossed by a network of informal paths.

Additional information

Although there is evidence of misuse and lack of management, the site still meets the SINC selection criteria, but would benefit from the re-introduction of appropriate management and the control of damaging activities, including the tipping of household/garden waste. The site also benefits from the protection of a Tree Preservation Order (TPO).


