Summary description

Small broadleaved woodland with a canopy of Oak and Beech and several semi-natural woodland indicator species in the ground flora. The northern part of the wood is grazed by sheep and has no shrub layer and a ground flora dominated by grasses and Bluebells. The southern part is on the sloping bank of a small stream with a canopy that includes Ash and Alder, and a densely tangled under storey of Hazel, Hawthorn and Bramble, with Bluebell, Hairy woodrush, Lesser celandine and good numbers of ferns and bryophytes. The southeastern boundary of the SINC is formed by the steep, largely un-vegetated rock-face of a disused guarry.

Qualifying features

Broad-leaved woodland with an assemblage of semi-natural indicator species.

Secondary features

Stream.

Rock exposure.

Potential value/ unconfirmed features

Likely to provide good foraging, flight lines and roosting opportunities for bats.

Potential habitat for Dormouse.

Current management (including problems and opportunities for biodiversity enhancement) Sheep graze the northern part of the woodland. A reduction in grazing would be beneficial for biodiversity (at least intermittently during the spring and summer). The southern part of the woodland appears largely unmanaged, although some maintenance is likely to be necessary periodically to maintain the stream and adjacent road. At the time of the survey the small stream beside the road was very turbid and contained fragments of *Elodea nuttallii* where sludge from ornamental ponds had been tipped beside the stream banks to the west of the SINC.

Access/ community use

There is no formal public access, but a road passes the southern boundary and a footpath passes part of the northwestern edge.

Additional information

The habitats along the stream and beside the road to the west of the SINC are also likely to be of value for nature conservation, particularly as they are likely to be used by any animals following the Cwm Gelli valley. These should be considered at future review.


