

Site Description:

Baglan Bay is a large expanse of mobile dune system and saltmarsh adjacent to heavily contaminated post-industrial land which is subject to remediation and regeneration. Baglan Bay is thought to be the location of the first recorded Matthiola sinuata (Sea Stock) plant, back in 1773. The system is located on the southern side of the Neath estuary near Briton Ferry, Baglan and Sandfields. Crymlyn Burrows SSSI and SINC are on the opposite side of the estuary, and are essentially part of the same system due to the likely movement of sand between them. Baglan Bay is the only mobile dune system remaining in Neath Port Talbot, although its integrity is compromised due to persistent and continued development of the surrounding land which will prevent the dunes from rolling backwards in response to sea level rise. The site also includes an area of previously developed land managed for one of the largest populations of Lapwing in Wales. This population is considered nationally important. Part of the site is currently managed by The Wildlife Trust of South and West Wales as part of a planning agreement.

Management Recommendations

Dune system is currently being managed by the Wildlife Trust of South and West Wales. The Lapwing Mitigation Site is currently being managed by St Modwens but this does not appear to be appropriate.
