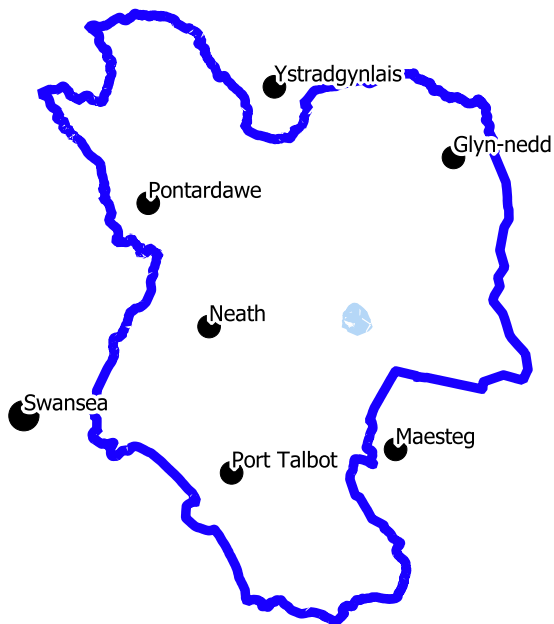

# TYLE'R WAUN

## Site Description:

An upland unit on Mynydd Canol in the form of a shallow basin at 300-350m asl. The underlying geology in this area is the South Wales Upper Coal Measures Formation, overlain by shallow peat. Modified blanket bog covers much of the site with the vegetation predominantly comprising marshy grassland (M25a), valley mire (M6d) and acid grassland communities. Ownership is unknown and sheep-grazing and suspected burning is likely to have reduced dwarf shrub cover. Recorded taxa include 105 vascular plants, 39 bryophytes, 1 lichen, 3 bird species, 1 amphibian, 2 reptiles and 3 invertebrate
