

Site Description:

This site lies to the east of the Nant-y-cafn settlement, south of Seven sisters towards the top of the Dulais Valley. It supports areas of marshy grassland and acid grassland. Some areas of the site are more diverse than others, however, the site supports a number of indicator species. The site's importance is due to the role it plays within a chain of species rich marshy grassland habitat patches in the Dulais Valley. Similar designated habitats in the vicinity include the Ynysdawle (NPTSINC071) and Heol Heddwch (NPTSINC073). In 2018 Butterfly Conservation found a Marsh fritiallary larval web.

Management Recommendations

Marshy grassland sites should ideally be grazed by cattle at a low density. The aim is an uneven patchwork of relatively short and longer vegetation. The application of broad-spectrum anti-parasitic drugs should be avoided as they persist in the dung and will kill dung beetles and dung fly larvae.
