

Site Description:

A large, species-rich meadow near to Resolven, adjacent to the A465, with an ecological gradient from dry, semi-improved neutral grassland through to swamp and wet woodland. There are significant populations of Great burnet and Marsh ragwort. The site is bounded on its west border, and separated from the River Neath, by an area of wet Alder/Willow woodland. A swampy area in this vicinity has Marsh cinqufoil and Branched bur-reed.

Important species

Species recorded: Great burnet, Marsh cinquefoil, Meadowsweet, Angelica, Water-purslane, Gipsywort, Branched bur-reed, Southern marsh-orchid

Habitat suitable for: Bats, Herps, Lesser-spotted Woodpecker, Marsh Tit, Song Thrush, Mistle Thrush, Spotted Flycatcher, Grey Wagtail, Lesser Redpoll

Management Recommendations

Grazing appears to have ceased on the site in 2016. A regime of periodic grazing/cutting will be required to maintain the site in reasonable condition.
