Site Description:

Species rich area of Purple moor-grass and rush pasture, quality varies throughout the site. Highlights include the designatory species Large-flowered eyebright and a contributory species Butterwort. The site supports a large number of significant and several locally scarce marshy grassland species such as Whorled caraway, Meadow thistle, Heath spotted orchid, Marsh pennywort, Marsh lousewort, Marsh arrowgrass, Marsh valerian, Dyer's greenweed, Saw-wort. The presence of upland health species such as Deer-grass, Pill sedge and Heath rush show the variety of habitats within the site.

The lower lying, west portion of the site has a large population of Saw-wort and a wet channel running diagonally across the site has a large population of Lemon-scented fern. The occurrence of a bryophyte community containing Scorpidium cossonii and Campylium stellatum is notable and indicative of base-flushing. It is the only site in NPT for Fen bedstraw. In 2018 Butterfly Conservation found 3 Marsh fritillary larval webs in the centre field.

Areas of the site would benefit from light pony/cattle grazing. Section C is largely neglected and requires some grazing to bring it into a reasonable condition.
