Site Area: 49.6 ha

Description:

This site comprises an extensive area of semi-natural woodland situated in the steep-sided Menascin valley to the south-west of Llanfrynach. A variety of wet and dry woodland types are present, and together they support a rich assemblage of higher and lower plants.

The drier, base-rich soils, particularly towards the head of the valley, support a canopy of sessile oak Quercus petraea with occasional downy birch Betula pubescens, hazel Corylus avellana, holly Ilex aquifolium and rowan Sorbus aucuparia. The ground flora is dominated by mixtures of common bent Agrostis capillaris, sweet vernal-grass Anthoxanthum odoratum, wavy hair-grass Deschampsia flexuosa and creeping soft-grass Holcus mollis, with frequent wood-sorrel Oxalis acetosella, bramble Rubus fruticosus and mosses such as Rhytidiadelphus squarrosus, Peudoscleropodium purum and Bluebell Hyacinthoides non-scripta, common cow-wheat Thuidium tamariscinum. Melanpyrum pratense and bracken Pteridium aquilinum are all locally abundant within this community. The more base-rich dry slopes support a canopy of ash Fraxinus excelsior over an understorey of hazel and some rowan. Species present in the field layer include lady-fern Athyrium filix-femina, enchanter's-nightshade Circaea lutetiana, tufted hair-grass Deschampsia cespitosa, dog's mercury Mercurialis perennis, wood-sorrel, rough meadow-grass Poa trivialis, barren strawberry Potentilla sterilis, lesser celandine Ranunculus ficaria, bramble and common dog-violet Viola riviniana. The stream-banks at the lower end of the valley also support ash woodland, but field maple Acer campestre and wych elm *Ulmus glabra* are present in the understorey. The field layer is extremely rich and supports species such as wood anemone Anemone nemorosa, lady-fern, false brome Brachypodium sylvatica, bluebell, yellow archangel Lamiastrum galeobdolon, yellow pimpernel Lysimachia nemorum, dog's mercury, harts-tongue Phyllitis Scolopendrium, lesser celandine and wood speedwell Veronica montana.

There are numerous wet flushes on the valley sides and in boggy hollows next to the stream. These support a canopy of alder Alnus glutinosa and ash, with frequent hazel and occasional downy birch, bird cherry Prunus padus and guelder-rose Viburnum opulus. The ground flora is rich and extremely variable. Local dominants include opposite-leaved golden-saxifrage Chrysosplenium oppositifolium, remote sedge Carex remota and tufted hair-grass, with meadowsweet Filipendula ulmaria, yellow pimpernel and creeping buttercup Ranunculus repens frequent throughout. Other associated species include marsh-marigold Caltha palustris, smooth-stalked sedge Carex laevigata, alternate-leaved golden-saxifrage Chrysosplenium alternifolium, great horsetail Equisetum telmateia, common marsh-bedstraw Galium palustre, sanicle Sanicula europaea and common valerian Valeriana officinalis. Towards the head of the valley the flushes become more base-poor, and are characterised by abundant purple moor-grass Molinia caerulea, bog-mosses Sphagnum spp. and species such as lemon-scented fern Oreopteris limbosperma.

Remarks:

The site lies within the Brecon Beacons National Park. Part is owned by the National Trust and part is managed as a nature reserve by the Brecknock Wildlife Trust.

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
